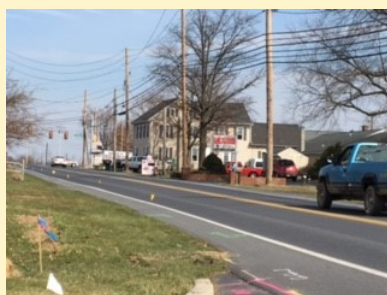

ROADWAY IMPROVEMENTS BEGIN AT PENRYN AND DOE RUN ROADS

After years of planning, improvements have begun at the intersection of Penryn and Doe Run Roads. Flyway Excavating has begun constructing storm drainage, utility pole relocations, public water, new traffic signal hardware, curb, handicap ramps, sidewalk, line painting, and roadway improvements from Two Cousins Pizza of Manheim to the Doe Run Elementary School on Doe Run Road and on Penryn Road from Stiegel Valley Road to approximately 600 feet south of Doe Run Road.

The work is expected to be completed by November 2016. Left turn lanes will be added to the road intersection along with updated signal equipment. Traffic flow will be open, sometimes with flaggers, along Doe Run Road and North Penryn Road. South Penryn Road will be closed for a phase of the work – and the public will be notified ahead of time.

A stormwater management basin along Stiegel Valley Road is part of the project. Several residential properties on Doe Run Road and South Penryn Road will get public water supply as part of the construction. If you have questions, please contact Mark Hiester at the Township office.

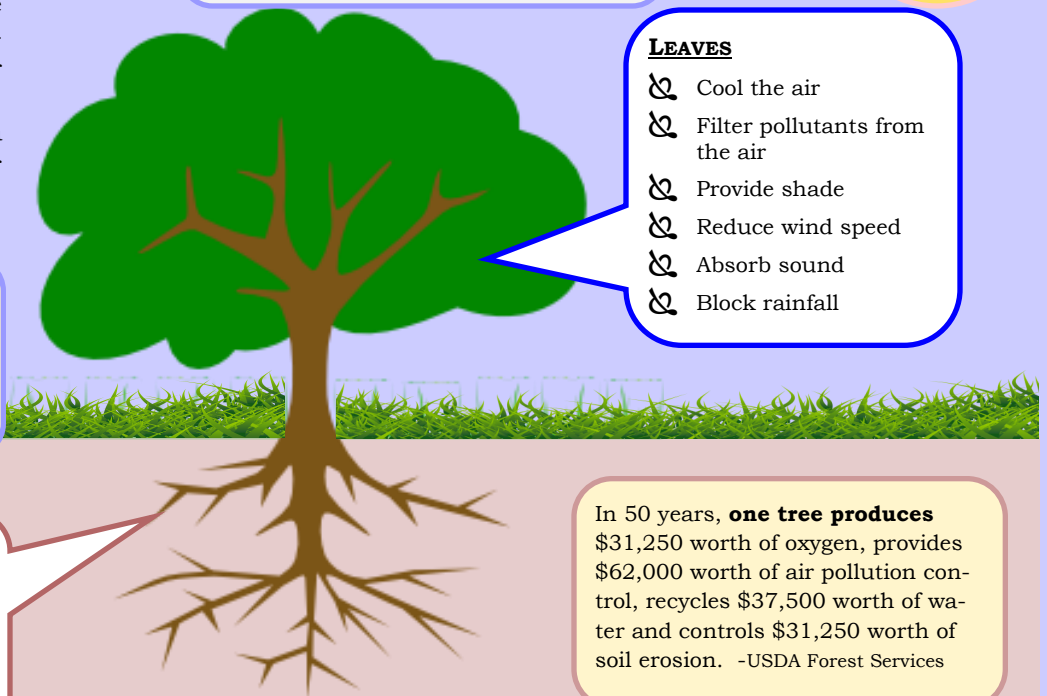

On December , 2015, the Penn Township Board of Supervisors adopted the 2016 Budget. The budget reflects the Township's commitment to effectively and efficiently provide a broad range of health and safety services, responsibly maintain and improve our infrastructure, protect and preserve our environment and natural resources, balance and manage appropriate rates of residential and commercial growth and development, and embrace our organizational mission to preserve and respect our past while building and sustaining a better long-term future for our community. Like many communities faced with growth pressures and the task of attempting to effectively manage these growth pressures, the Township continues to find itself in the challenging position of attempting to properly balance the diversity of perspectives and expectations for the type and range of services within our community. While difficult and at times emotionally driven, it is ultimately important to remember that this challenge is not unique to Penn Township; it is a challenge that has been faced by many municipalities in Lancaster County, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and throughout this country. It is a challenge that all communities face at one point or another as they change and respond to what truly is unavoidable change.

It is our belief that a budget represents one of the Township's most fundamental policy documents and as such should be able to communicate a clear and transparent policy direction so that various constituents have the necessary information to engage themselves in their local government. As such, we commit to continuing to build the content and resources of this document in the future.

DON'T BLOW IT into the street

Blowing or leaving grass clippings and other debris in the street during yard maintenance doesn't just look bad, it's **ILLEGAL!** The Township considers it to be "befouling the streets" and a violation of the Township Code.

Fines for blowing or leaving grass clippings in the street can run as high as \$1,000.



WHY?

- Grass clippings can clog storm water drain systems and pollute the water. When drains are clogged with clippings and debris, rain and storm water can back up and flood homes and property.
- Grass clippings create a slippery surface on the roads, which can result in accidents.

So what's the best place for yard trimmings?

- Sweep, collect, and bag clippings and leaves.
- Blow grass clippings back onto the lawn, where they become mulch and natural fertilizer.
- Rake or blow clippings into a compost pile, where they can decompose without odor.



WATERSHED ALLIANCE ACTIVITY UPDATES



Chiques Creek

Planning for the 5th Annual Watershed Expo is underway. The Expo will be held at the Liederkrantz on Wednesday, June 22, 2016 from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm.

Members of the CCWA will be participating with Manheim Central SD's Watershed Day in May.

The CCWA's Model Rain Garden was displayed at the PA State Farm Show in January 2016. It will be displayed at the state conference for municipal officials in April.

Lititz Run

The 2016 Stream Clean-up Day will be held on March 19, 2016.

Last September 130 trees were planted at Snavelly Mill as part of a riparian buffer project. An additional 50 trees were planted at the Nelson Nolt Farm in October.

The LRWA is working to improve their monitoring program of the Santo Domingo Tributary. Data would be used to document the effect floodplain restoration has on flooding and improving water quality.

LOOKING FOR A FUN WEEKEND ACTIVITY? CONSIDER THE TOUR DE CHIQUES

The Tour de Chiques is an interactive tour designed to educate and inform visitors about key locations within the Chiques Creek watershed. The Tour begins at the Penn Township Water Treatment Plant located along Doe Run Road just east of Manheim. Once you are in the parking lot at the water treatment facility you may choose to download the narrative portions of the Tour in .mp3 format to your smartphone or stream directly from your phone. There are six additional stops on the tour, and they include: Swan Park, Mummau Park, Logan Park, Benedict Farm, Auction Road Bridge, and the Liederkrantz. While not currently a part of the tour, you can end your day with a visit to the Trial Gardens at the PennState Southeast Agricultural Research & Extension Center. FREE Home Compost Workshops Scheduled

The Lancaster County Solid Waste Management Authority (LCSWMA) is partnering with municipalities, community organizations and Penn State Master Gardeners of Lancaster County to conduct home compost workshops where residents will learn how to recycle organic waste from their kitchens and gardens instead of putting it in the trash. Composting is an excellent way to recycle vegetable scraps, grass clippings, leaves, and other organic materials and turn them into a useful and valuable soil amendment.



Workshop attendees will also learn how to build effective, yet inexpensive home compost bins to meet their needs. Each household in attendance will be eligible to receive a free kitchen scrap collection bucket courtesy of LCSWMA.

Lancaster County residents are invited to attend any one of the home compost workshops scheduled for this year. If required, residents should pre-register by no later than Friday at noon prior to the workshop they'll be attending.

SPRING PROJECT?

YOU MAY NEED A PERMIT

Do you have a spring project planned this year? If so, you may need a permit. Along with building additions and renovations, permits are required for fences, storage sheds, driveways, decks, swimming pools, and basement improvements.

The Township has to review these projects to ensure that easements (stormwater, utilities, etc.) and that zoning and building requirements are met. Permit applications are available on the Township website or in the office. If you are not sure if you need a permit, don't hesitate to call the office at 665-4508.



FLOOD MAP UPDATES

After several years of planning, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has finalized new flood maps. These maps are also known as Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs). As part of the map update, the Township was required by FEMA to update any ordinances that regulate floodplains. This was required in order for residents of the Township to maintain their flood insurance. These changes were originally discussed in the Spring 2014 newsletter, and notices were sent to property owners that would be affected by the change. On **March 14, 2016**, the new ordinance was adopted by Penn Township—as required by FEMA. The new FIRMs will become effective on **April 5, 2016**. Changes to the maps are also provided on the Township website in the "Residents & Businesses" drop-down menu at the top of the front page.

Private market flood insurance is available to many Pennsylvania homeowners, in many cases at substantial savings over the federal government plan. A new webpage was created that lists flood coverage available to Pennsylvania homeowners and renters. OUTDOOR BURNING REMINDER



A burning permit is required for all bonfires, open fires, and some contained fires.

Permits are free!

To obtain a permit, call the Township Office with the date, time, and location of the burn. The Township will then issue a permit. Please call at least 3 days before your proposed burn.

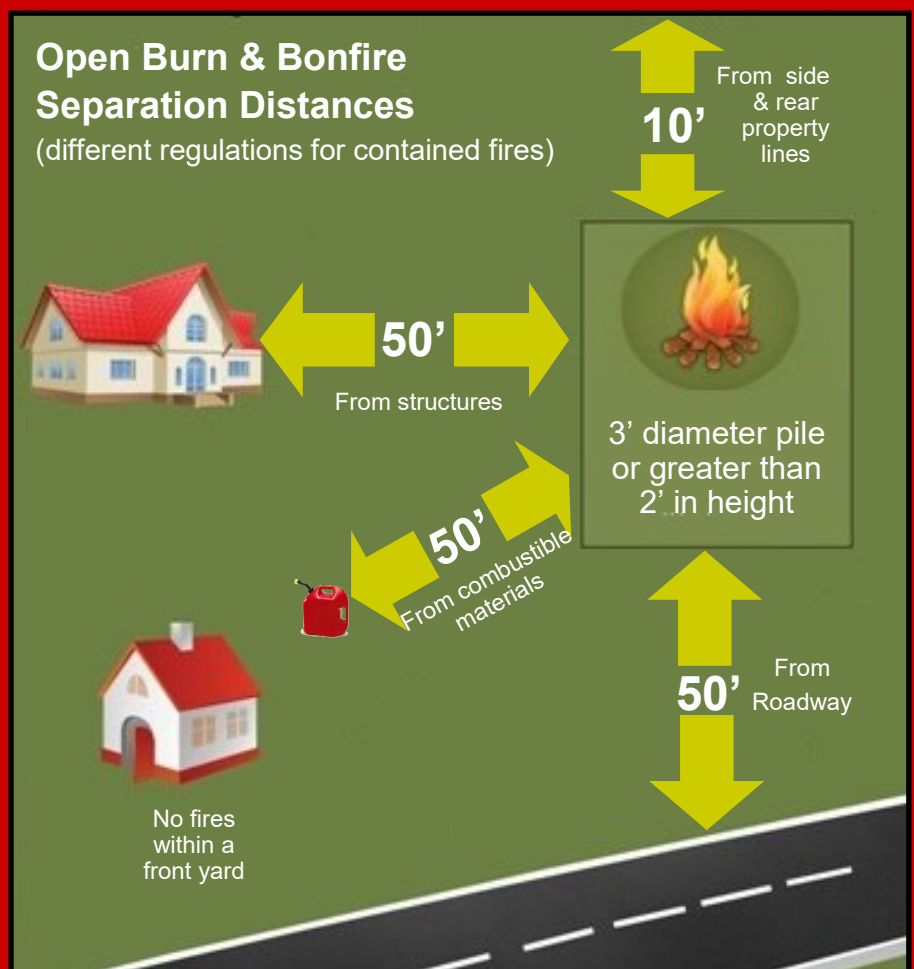
IF A FIRE BAN EMERGENCY IS DECLARED—ALL OUTDOOR BURNING OR FIRES ARE PROHIBITED!

BURNING OF HOUSEHOLD GARBAGE, RUBBISH, CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS, AND RECYCLABLES IS NOT ALLOWED

Township Code prohibits burning of the following items:

- Common household garbage and rubbish, such as rags, old clothes, leather, rubber, carpets, furniture, crockery, masonry, and other similar items.
- Construction debris, Styrofoam, aerosol cans, and by-products of manufacturing and processing operations.
- Recyclable materials such as glass, aluminum and steel cans, plastics, newsprint, tires, and appliances.

The only items that may be burned are leaves, brush, and branches,

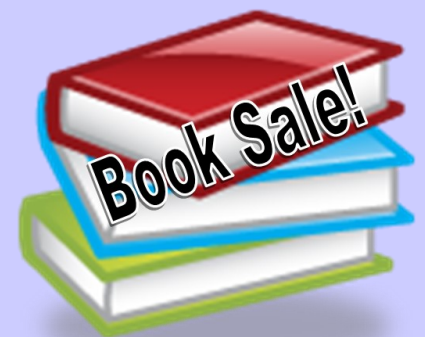
