LANCASTER COUNTY'S 100,000TH ACRE OF PRESERVED FARMLAND LOCATED HERE IN PENN TOWNSHIP

On December 5th, the Bruce & Patricia Lefever farm at 745 Fruitville Pike will be preserved through a partnership consisting of Penn Township, the Lancaster County Agricultural Preserve Board, and the Lancaster Farmland Trust. Securing this Agricultural Conservation Easement is a big part of the township and countywide goal to preserve large, productive areas of farmland for generations to come, sparing them from the path of growth.

The Lefever farm will bring Penn Township's preserved farm acreage closer to 3,400—but more importantly, it will break through the 100,000-acre threshold in Lancaster County! Not only will our county be the first in Pennsylvania to reach this tremendous milestone, it will be the first in the United States. This is very fitting, given that Lancaster County contains the most productive non-irrigated soils in the entire nation. But at the same time, we have seen considerable growth pressures over the past several decades from our location on the fringes of several major metropolitan areas.

Penn Township's involvement in local preservation efforts has been ramped up since the adoption of our Transfer of Development Rights (TDR) program. (For more information on TDRs, see the article in the Fall 2012 edition of the Township News.) As part of this transaction, the township will acquire TDRs that can be purchased by landowners and developers to intensify residential and commercial uses. Promoting agriculture in our community AND providing a way to

incentivize more efficient use of land within planned growth areas are two ways to move Penn Township into the future without losing sight of its rural heritage.

Congratulations to the Lefever family, the many proud generations of Lancaster County farmers, and the leaders of agricultural preservation in our community.

TREE PLANTING WRAPPED UP AT THE TOWNSHIP PARKS

If you've been keeping up with the Township News this year, there has been no shortage of articles detailing the tree planting events at the township parks. October 5th was a bittersweet day at Sweetbriar Creek Park, where the last of four planting days took place. The first shovels hit the ground all the way back on April 20th in Cedar Hollow Park, where the first of 100 trees were put in the ground.

At least the original plan was to plant 100 trees—but with the great volunteer support and cost-effective tree stock, we were presented with a fantastic opportunity to take another bite at the apple and round out the parks with evergreens and ornamentals in the fall. 66 more trees made their way to the parks thanks to the help of nearby residents and Boy Scouts. Only one tree didn't make it into the winter (it was replaced by the vendor at no charge) and many survived attacks from Japanese beetles. Like many of the people that helped, we are excited to see the trees grow over the coming years!



NEW & IMPROVED TOWNSHIP WEBSITE IS UP AND RUNNING LOG IN TO STAY CONNECTED




After months of transition preparations to move from our outdated web platform, Penn Township's new site went live over the first weekend in November! You'll find that navigation is much easier—nearly every page is accessible from the front page's drop-down menus at the top. Even though the site has drastically changed, our address hasn't: www.penntwplanco.org. Please note, however, that an outdated address established through Lancaster County (www.co.lancaster.pa.us/penntwp) is no longer in use.

There are several functions that we hope you will find useful to keep in touch with us, but they all start with creating a user profile. Find the "Sign In" button at the top right corner of the front page (on right) and follow a few simple steps to create your profile. This will enable you to access additional features such as E-Notifications and Report a Concern.


Once your profile is set up, you can find these features in the left column of the homepage (see below). E-Notifications is a messaging service that

will contact you either by email or text



Another new feature is Report a Concern, which allows you to submit information about a number of issues. Currently, this function is set for you to report abandoned vehicles, property maintenance violations, road repair concerns, street lights out, and illicit discharges into waterways or gutters. Once the report is submitted, it is sent directly to the appropriate staff members for action. It also enables us to communicate back to you regarding progress or completion of the task.

SNOW SEASON IS ALMOST HERE—GET FAMILIAR WITH THE TOWNSHIP'S SNOW REMOVAL GUIDELINES

The Penn Township Public Works Department understands that when the snow flies, life on the roads can be a trying time. We try real hard to do the best and quickest job possible to make the roads safe and clear of snow and ice. Cindering usually starts right after the snow begins to fall, with plowing starting around 3" of accumulation. Cindering and plowing routes are set up to clear the more heavily traveled roads first. Then we take care of the secondary roads and development streets. All roads are usually plowed over twice. We make an effort to plow through all of the streets/roads once to get everything at least passable and then the second time to get the snow to the edge of the road or curb. Penn Township is committed to providing excellent snow removal service.

In order to help us do a better job, we ask that township residents help us in a couple of areas:

- ALL CARS are to be parked in driveways or off the street, during a snow event, to allow the Public Works Department to clear the street back to the edge of the road or curb. This allows for the next storm or water to run from the snow melt.
- NO CARS should be parked in a CUL-DE-SAC. Cul-de-sacs can be time consuming, and having cars on the street make it very difficult to clear and/or turn around.
- During a plowing operation, snow will go into your driveway. If possible, wait until the street or road is plowed before clearing driveway openings. Shovel the snow to the right side of your driveway as you face the street. This allows the snowplow to take the snow away from your driveway.
- PLEASE DO NOT THROW OR BLOW SNOW ONTO THE STREET! This creates a hazardous and unsafe condition on an already cleared roadway. If this is done and the snow refreezes overnight it can become quite icy and dangerous to traffic and a potential liability for the homeowner, if an accident should occur.
- For safety reasons, shovel out fire hydrants if they are located on your property.

Mailboxes: Heavy snow, as it is plowed, will occasionally damage or topple mailboxes. Heavy, wet snow exiting the plow increases the potential for mailbox damage. To lower the potential for damage, make sure your mailbox is secured tightly, on a sturdy post. It is Penn Township's policy that the repair of mailboxes and lawns is the property owners' responsibility, since the right-of-way extends further onto your property than you realize. The Public Works Department makes every effort not to damage mailboxes or property, but it does happen.

Basketball Poles/Nets: Basketball poles are not acceptable items within the right-of-way. As an unapproved structure within the legal right-of-way, the following applies:

- Penn Township will not pay for any damage to basketball poles, nets, or other recreational equipment located within the public right-of-way that is damaged by plowed snow or struck during plowing operations.
- Penn Township will seek full payment for damage to salting/plowing equipment caused by recreational
 equipment located within the public right-of-way.

WINTER SAFETY TIPS FOR DRIVERS

- Stay back at least 100 feet, when following trucks or equipment that is plowing or cindering and is displaying a flashing amber strobe light.
- Always follow in a manner that the truck driver can see you in his side mirrors.
- Turn on headlights, to make your vehicle more visible.
- Snow removal trucks or equipment may have to slow down, stop, or backup! BEWARE!
- Because of safety, DO NOT EVER PASS A SNOWPLOW, while it is in the process of plowing.
- SLOW DOWN, DRIVE DEFENSIVELY, AND HAVE A SAFE WINTER SEASON!


