One of the really beneficial things that resulted in response to Covid-19, is that we began collaborative efforts with our public safety and response peers (neighboring EMS leaders, Law Enforcement, hospitals, the Department of Health (DOH) and others) by taking part in web-based meetings and/or phone conferences where we would share information on PPE resources and mitigation strategies. While daily conversations have ceased, we've forged a deeper mutual aid relationship that strengthens all of our capabilities.

On July 21st as training was wrapping up, Penryn Station 28 and Manheim Rescue 26 were dispatched for a farm rescue in Penn Township.

Crews from both stations and EMS responded immediately and were advised of a young child entrapped in corn up to his neck in a bin wagon. The Penryn Fire Chief and EMS Lieutenant put LifeLion 1 on standby.

Since Penryn Fire crews were there first, they began the process of stabilizing the remaining

corn as best as possible along with patient care. With the combined efforts of crews from Penryn, Manheim and NWEMS, the patient stabilized and secured, the bottom of the wagon was cut out freeing the patient. Within a minute, he was handed off to the awaiting medic.

Total time from dispatch to extrication was 20 minutes. Thankfully, LifeLion was not needed and the patient was transferred to Hershey Medical Center with no apparent life-threatening injuries.

2021 Budget

Township officials have *drafted* a 2021 budget that is balanced. No tax increase or increase of public sewer or public water rates are anticipated. The *proposed* 2021 budget is expected to be approved by the Board of Supervisors at its 7pm, November 23 public meeting. A required 20-day public review period follows. Then the board is scheduled to hold a public hearing on the *final* budget at its 7pm, December 14, 2020 public meeting, when it may be adopted.

WINTER STORM SAFETY & TIPS

The Penn Township Public Works Department understands that when the snow flies, life on the roads can be a trying time. We try hard to do the best and quickest job possible to make the roads safe and clear of snow and ice. Cindering usually starts right after the snow begins to fall, with plowing starting around 3" of accumulation. Cindering and plowing routes are set up to clear the more heavily traveled roads first, then secondary roads and development streets. All roads are usually plowed over twice. We make an effort to plow through all of the streets and roads once to get everything at least passable and then the second time to get the snow to the edge of the road or curb. Penn Township is committed to providing excellent snow removal service.



- Stay back at least 100 ft, when following plow trucks or equipment
- Turn on headlights
- For your safety, DO NOT PASS A SNOW PLOW when it is plowing
- Clear a minimum 3ft area around fire hydrants within 24 hrs
- ◆ A 3ft wide path must be cleared from sidewalks of snow and ice within 24 hrs
- Snow and ice must not be deposited next to a fire hydrant, on a sidewalk or loading/ unloading area
- Damage to mailboxes, nets, poles or other obstructions within the right-of-way are the property owner's responsibility

WINTER STORMWATER POLLUTION PREVENTION TIPS

Start shoveling early! The more snow you remove, the less salt and sand you'll need. Here are some do's and don'ts when shoveling or plowing snow.

DO:

- Pile snow in locations with the most opportunity to infiltrate into the ground.
- Pile snow in areas where water does not pond.
- Clear away any snow that may have been thrown onto the storm drains.

DON'T:

- x Do not pile snow on top of storm drains or near water bodies and wetlands.
- x Do not pile snow onto rain gardens or bioretention areas.

TIPS TO AVOID USING SALT AS A DEICER

More salt does not equal more melting snow. Follow product instructions when spreading deicing material and give it time to work. Sweep up any material

remaining after the snow/ice melts. When temperatures hit 15°F or below, salt is not effective. Consider using



traction materials that contain an acetate, potassium chloride, magnesium chloride, or cracked cornmeal instead of sand or kitty litter.



Pay close attention to places that may have eroded during the snow melt. Plan to improve these areas in the spring by using native grasses, meadow plants, or native trees and shrubs.

Normal snow accumulation does not pose a threat to rain gardens, so there is no need to shovel a rain garden. However, heavy snow loads can weigh down and saturate your garden and hurt plants. Pile snow uphill from the rain garden so when the snow melts the rain garden can do what it is designed to do.

It's still important to Recycle Right!

As a reminder, please include only "Big 4" materials in your curbside recycling bin, including:

- Corrugated cardboard
- Plastic bottles and jugs with necks
- Metal food and beverage cans
- Glass bottles and jars



Before putting those items in the bin, remember to flatten boxes, empty, rinse and remove lids from containers.

Lancaster County residents can dispose these items and more for FREE at LCSWMA's HHW Facility located at 1299 Harrisburg Pike, Lancaster. The HHW Facility is open Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. – 4 p.m. and Saturdays from 8 – 11 a.m.

Penn Township 2020 Accomplishments

• Saved \$769,270 in interest payments over ten years by refinancing \$9,406,000 of debt from 2.71 percent to 1.26 percent.

- Obtained up to a \$1.45 million state transportation grant for the Fruitville Pike, Temperance Hill Road, and Holly Tree Road intersection project.
- Obtained a \$200,000 NFWF Grant for a staterequired stormwater (MS4) project.
- Applied for a state \$200,000 Growing Greener grant to construct a state-required stormwater (MS4) project.
- Negotiated with a developer to get a previous \$305,543 recreation fee to be used by the township for state-required stormwater (MS4) projects.
- Applied to receive \$120,000 of Federal CARES Act funds through the county.
- Obtained a new \$150,000 Western Star single-axle dump truck to replace a 1997 International dump truck.
- Refurbished a 2001 Tandem axle dump truck for \$27,000.
- Sold a 1997 International Dump Truck and a Box Salt Spreader for a total of \$9,650.00.
- Saved \$4,649 by replacing property and liability insurance and got increased coverage and service.
- Created a partnership for a state-required street sweeping service, from East Petersburg Borough.
- At the request of the landowner, and with the support of the County Agricultural Preserve Board, rezoned 14.4 acres of a farm from Commercial to Agricultural so the farm can be preserved. Preserved 98.14 acres to farmland.
- Started drafting new zoning and land development codes.
- Continued Non-residential (sewer) Wastewater Program: limiting fats, oils, and grease -and extending the life of the treatment plant.
- Performed road maintenance on Bedington Circle, South Copehill Drive, Goldfinch Lane, Hallmark Drive, Sunrise Drive, Wood Duck Drive, Warehouse Road, North Copehill Drive, and South Oak Street with Manheim Borough.
- Performed paving projects on Sego Sago Road, Bucknoll Road and Woodlot Road, including modest widenings at each intersection.
- Performed paving on Airy Hill Road, between North Penryn Road and Locust Grove Road, with a \$46,528.87 Lancaster County Conservation District, Low Volume Roads, Grant.



- Added wastewater treatment plant garage improvements so workers there can perform equipment repairs in all weather.
- Arranged for food trucks to be permitted in Township parks.
- Employee pension plan is a very high, 112 percent funded.
