

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2023 Year in Review

Road Construction

- Pipe, endwalls, and guiderail project on Elm Road
- Bank taken back on Elm Road, in the area of the pipe and endwall project
- Boyer Run Road reclaim a section for better sight distance at Locust Lane, Pave and shoulder work
- Airy Hill Road (Speedwell Forge Road to North Penryn Road)

 pipe work, reclaim, pave, and shoulder work
- Widened North Penryn Road (Oak Lane to the Township line) from 19 feet to 24 feet
- Redid all of the stop bars and cross walks at the intersections of Penryn Road and Doe Run Road and North Penryn Road and Stiegel Valley Road
- Helped Rapho Township, in August, with an inlet and pipe project at the intersection of Colebrook Road and Mill Road
- Replaced all of the old steel pipes with concrete pipes on Lititz Road
- Filled in banks on Fairview Road with fill and topsoil and seeded the widened banks
- Created better sight distance at the intersection of Temperance Hill Road and West Lexington Road by removing a bank and creating a sightline easement with the property owners
- Ultra-thin bonded wearing coarse projects on West Lexington Road (Temperance Hill Road to Sego Sago Road) and Sego Sago Road (Fruitville Pike to West Lexington Road)
- Sealcoat projects on Brooklawn Road, East Pleasant View Road, Pine Street, Mockingbird Lane, and Airy Hill Road (Locust Grove Road to North Penryn Road)

Penryn Fire Company


- Fire Company was dispatched to 155 incidents The estimated value of total property endangered was \$2,270,000 which gave us a 75.33% of property saved for the year 2023
- The annual Mud Sale held in March 2023 was a success for the Penryn Fire Company and the Limerock Parochial School, a major fundraiser for the two organizations; the sale had 955 bidders who came from near and far 69 bidders were from states outside of Pennsylvania
- Continues to have the support of our community through the annual fund drive with a 31% return; dollar amounts went from \$68,857.03 in 2022 to \$78,783 in 2023
- Received the Pennsylvania Fire Commissioners
 Office Grant for \$15,000 which was used to
 purchase five sets of bunker gear
- In 2023 the Penryn Fire Company placed a refurbished Squad 28-1 in service by purchasing a new chassis, then taking the box off of the old squad, refurbishing and installing it on the new chassis saving the fire company approximately \$450,000
- The Penryn Fire Company Relief Association purchased 41 new air cylinders for \$62,299 replacing outdated air cylinders used on the self-contained breathing apparatus



Yard Waste Recycling Facility is to be built with a \$350,000 state grant (proposed plan above) and is expected to be ready in late 2024 or early 2025.

Wish-Cycling, Willful Disregard and Improper Recycling Costs Customers

Why, some may ask. I thought we were required to recycle. Yes, Penn Township, along with many municipalities, requires community members and businesses to recycle under Pennsylvania's Municipal Waste Planning Recycling and Waste Reduction Act, commonly known as Act 101 of 1988. When community members and businesses throw or allow trash to be disposed of within their recycle recepticles, it costs YOU, the customer. Trash needs to be removed by machine or by hand.

Karen Gross, the authority's communications manager, said, if workers on the transfer station's tipping floor — the place where waste and recycling haulers dump their loads — see an unrecyclable item like say, a garden hose, they'd pull it out. So does a lot of other unrecyclable stuff. "We are still currently seeing about 20 to 40% of trash ending up in the recycling bin," Gross said.

While automated machinery is heavy-duty, they are not immune to damage. When brake rotors, lithium batteries, cords, hoses, plastic bags or packaging plastic, Christmas lights, bowling balls and the like are placed in recycling or trash, they cause damage, sometimes severe, causing down time. One such example is that a battery was responsible for damage to a seven-year-old facility which cost \$35 million to rebuild. Thankfully, no employees were hurt in the fire.

Sorting trash is not a glorious job. How would you like to do it?

How can I do my part?

Just because you *think* something should be recyclable, doesn't mean it is. The following items are recyclable by LCSWMA:

- dry, flattened corrugated cardboard (wet or greasy cardboard, such as pizza boxes are not recyclable)
- clean plastic bottles and jugs with necks, lids and caps removed
- clean metal food and beverage cans
- clean glass jars and bottles, lids and caps removed

If you're not sure if something is recyclable, throw it out.

Some items not listed above are recyclable, such as paper, however you may be responsible for bringing them to a facility that can use them. Contact your trash hauler for items that they accept.

Penn Township is requesting feedback from your household regarding preferences for trash and recycling services. Penn Township is considering adopting an optional single hauler contract (hauler and contract information are yet to be determined) for trash hauling and recyclable materials.

In order to make an informed decision, the Township is requesting feedback from all community members for how they would like to move forward with trash and recycling. Our neighboring municipality, Rapho Township, has had success recently including an "opt-out" option for its households who no longer wish to use the Township's designated hauler.

Important information to consider:

- Penn Township must maintain a majority of households for this to work the best!

 The more people who use the service, the better! Rapho Township currently quotes community members \$75/quarter. https://www.raphotownship.com/2150/Trash-Recycling-Collection.
- Commercial establishments are not included in this survey. This survey and request is for RESIDENTIAL trash and recycling only.
- Contract information and details such as: hauler, day of pickup, frequency of pick up, price, opt-out options, etc. are unavailable at this time. Penn Township is only trying to gauge preference for single hauler vs. multi-hauler (current).
